European Standards and Guidelines (ESG) Agencies

Standard 3.3: Independence

"Agencies should be independent and act autonomously. They should have full responsibility for their operations and the outcomes of those operations without third party influence."

European Standards and Guidelines (ESG) Agencies

Standard 3.3: Independence

"Autonomous institutions need independent agencies as counterparts. In considering the independence of an agency the following are important:

- Organisational independence, demonstrated by official documentation...;
- Operational independence: the definition and operation of the agency's procedures...;
- Independence of formal outcomes... "

"Agencies should have an established legal basis and should be formally recognised as quality assurance agencies by competent public authorities."
